

Abolition of Nuclear Weapons

Since August 1945, when two cities, Hiroshima and Nagasaki, were turned into horrifying infernos by a single bomb which annihilated tens of thousands of human beings immediately, with many more dying in agony soon after, humanity has struggled to extinguish this fire from hell. But the number of Declared Nuclear States keeps growing, bringing ever more fear and instability into the world.

In the eight years of the Bush-Cheney Administration, President Bush has spoken publicly, several times, of the possibility of using nuclear weapons.

We believe if the US, which has 10,000 nuclear weapons, committed to eliminate our nuclear weapons, a tremendous source of fear world-wide would radically diminish and the entire global atmosphere would be transformed.

President Barack Obama has rightly said, "A world without nuclear weapons is profoundly in America's interest. It is our responsibility to make the commitment and to do the hard work to make this vision a reality."

In 2010, the very important Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty will be reviewed at the United Nations. The NPT has been signed by the United States, and if honored by the USA and other signatories, could be a true vehicle for global nuclear disarmament.

Mayors for Peace is one organization that works to galvanize the voices of mayors from around the world to abolish nuclear weapons. Neither ours nor anyone else's city should ever be targeted by nuclear weapons of any kind.

Over 2400 mayors world-wide have joined, including more than 100 from the United States. Please ask your mayor to join. If your mayor is already a Mayor for Peace, please keep him/her and your entire community informed about the growing movement to ensure nuclear weapons will be completely eliminated from the Earth by the year 2020.

Renunciation of War

Japan's Post-war Constitution is a working model

The lethal power of the US military is immeasurably stronger, and thus more terrifying, than all other military establishments in the world. Our brief 200 year history is full of war-making and, at least 40% of our taxes go directly to the military. This culture of war and violence deeply affects all parts of our lives. We are so financially-committed and physically-tied to war, that no matter how much people desire peace it is seen as an unattainable dream at best.

But it is not an illusory dream. It is a dream that is within our grasp. The people of the world are awakening and insist that the time is now to lift the albatross of war from around our necks and to allow people to live and develop their lives.

A concrete example of a constitutional commitment to the renunciation of war is seen in Japan's post-war constitution. Article 9 of their constitution reads in part, "Aspiring sincerely to an international peace based on justice and order, the Japanese people forever renounce war as a sovereign right of the nation and the threat or use of force as a means of settling international disputes ..."

Although it has been a struggle for the people of Japan to hold on to Article 9 for over 60 years, the power of the popular commitment to it has protected Japan from firing any weapons at anyone. Nor has Japan been attacked. The UN has recognized that peace among Asian-Pacific nations has been successfully protected by the power of Japan's Article 9.

The international community has focused their attention on the moral power of Article 9, and a movement is growing to call for all nations to adopt the essence of Article 9 in their constitutions. (See www.article9.org)
